The Pastor's Voice

Will Anyone Hear Us If Our Message Is Only About What We Oppose?

For a long time, I have pondered this question in light of the frequency of "opposition" that seems to pervade the Christian community in many forms. The answer to the above question is absolutely, yes. We will often and loudly be heard when we present to the world and those who will listen our statements of opposition over and against any number of things. We can be militant and full of invectives against many things and people and actions of the present world. But it strikes me as a great paradox that any Christian would stand to "throw stones" in any particular direction when Jesus could be in our midst writing in the sand about any or all of our faults and failures. I refer to the incident when a woman was brought before Jesus, said to have been "caught" in the act of an adulterous relationship. They came bringing her to Jesus in anticipation of his agreeing with them that she should be stoned to death (the penalty for adultery at the time). Jesus knelt and wrote in the sand and said, "He who is without sin, let him cast the first stone." Such words are trouble to our sensibilities that tell us justice is to be upheld. But Jesus notes the reality, that though they have brought the woman, the man involved is no where being held accountable; such are the marks of our imperfect "justice" as well. Too much of the time, we are the ones joining the crowd to oppose one thing or another without ever considering the truth about our own actions and attitudes. If you remember, all those who brought the woman left without throwing any stone at all. Only Jesus remained, and he said to her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go and sin no more." (See John 8:11)

Scripture often warns, sets boundaries, and offers the word of God to us for our blessing and guidance. To disregard such truth and wisdom and instruction is to reap the consequences. At the same time, our judgments, while informed, may often be flawed. What do we lack in understanding? What are we blind to truly see? What factors may shape our opinions, but fail to guide our Christlikeness?

Everywhere Christians are challenged to discover the "perfect will of God." That is best accomplished in the light of Jesus and his words and actions. To know Christ and to follow him requires a radical "re-centering" of our lives. To say, "Jesus is Lord" and to mean it, also means to follow his teachings. Over and over again Jesus insists that we forgive others as we know for-giveness in Christ. If we are forgiving, how can we then continue to berate sinners like ourselves, for not knowing the way of Jesus when we have been the ones called to share the love of Christ with them and have not?

Someone once said, sharing our faith is like one hungry man telling another hungry man where to find bread. To acknowledge that we are personally sinners who received grace also means we have a responsibility to share with others where that grace is found --- in Jesus Christ.

It is disheartening to think that the things Christians are known for are too often, only what we are against. Especially when those things are so seldom the things standing in the way of people knowing Jesus. Too often what stands in the way of that is our silence, our quickness to judge, and our failure to be the bearers of the light and love of our Savior. Hiding behind our hates may serve to satisfy our pleasure in "choosing sides," but heaven help us if we think God isn't interested in something else. The last time I heard about Jesus, he was bringing down the walls of separation. He was healing and restoring and uplifting. He was loving and teaching and pointing us all to repentance and faith and vitality in relationship to Him. He went to the cross doing that. Even death was not able to keep him silenced, when His resurrection declared the power of God in our midst. If we offer the world evidence of our faith in Jesus, it likely will be recognizable by an unfailing demonstration of mercy, grace, forgiveness and love...like Jesus'.
