PASTOR'S CORNER:

"THE WAY OF LOVE IN A WORLD DIVIDED"

We reside in an American world that is divided. In using labels like right and left, Republican and Democrat, conservative and liberal, white and black, we give our seal of approval to the jargon that perpetuates division. We can easily fall into the trap that staking our claim in being right is how we advance God's Kingdom. We tend to believe, because we have Jesus behind us, that our way is the only way to live – and then we use our political stances, and even the Bible, to justify our correctness.

Valentine's Day is right around the corner. It's a day that we set aside to celebrate love. In honor of this unique upcoming holiday, I invite you to read the chapter in the Bible that is often referred to as "The Love Chapter," 1 Corinthians 13.

Being people of love does not mean that we should not have an opinion, or even that we should not voice our views. But it does mean we are attentive to how we express our views and to the extent we are willing to *listen* to those whose views

differ from our own. We ought not dismiss thoughts different from our own as "evil." Demonizing people is not the attitude of Christ.

If we are not careful, we can find ourselves like the Pharisees, whose chief sin was the desire to be "Right." In their desire to be "Right" they found themselves hating the man who came with the message that the most important thing was treating humans as humans. Jesus' message was *love*. Those of us who desire to always be right will have a difficult time understanding that message.

How will we respond to a world divided? Will we, too, stake our claim in being right? Or might we seek to be people of love and reconciliation? We all have a choice. May we guard our words closely. May we listen and think before we speak. And more than anything, may we spread love with our words and actions throughout our own little corners of the world.

Take My Life and Let It Be

A Prayer Lived Out in Life

Frances Ridley Havergal (1836-1879) of England began writing verse at age seven. Her insatiable thirst for the Bible led her to memorize the entire New Testament, Psalms, Isaiah, and the Minor Prophets. She was a concert contralto soloist and a brilliant classical pianist. She gave her life to Christ at age fifteen.

At age twenty-one she stood in the art gallery at Dusseldorf, Germany, looking at the painting of the crucifixion with the engraving beneath it, "This I have done for thee; what has thou done for Me?" In the previous century the wealthy young Count Zinzendorf of Moravian missionary fame read these same words and was led to consecrate his life to Christ. As she stood there, her very soul was stirred. Tears cascaded down her cheeks. From that moment she dedicated her talents to the service of the Lord.

Throughout her life she was frail and delicate in health and died at the early age of forty-two. When she wrote "Take my life, and let it be consecrated, Lord, to Thee," it was for her a prayer. And when she penned the words, "Take my silver and my gold," she did exactly that! She gave fifty pieces of jewelry (heirlooms) to the Church Missionary Society, including a jewel cabinet that she said was "fit for a countess." She retained only a brooch for daily wear that was a memorial of her parents, and a locket with a portrait of her niece who had gone to heaven. Of that experience she wrote, "I don't think I need tell you I never packed a box with such pleasure." Despite the dark nights of frequent sickness and suffering, the dedicated life of this poetess can best be summed up in her own prayer lyrics.

Take My Life and Let it Be

Take my life and let it be Consecrated, Lord, to Thee; Take my hands and let them move At the impulse of Thy love, At the impulse of Thy love.

Take my feet and let them be Swift and beautiful for Thee; Take my voice and let me sing Always, only, for my King, Always, only, for my King.

Take my silver and my gold, Not a mite would I withhold; Take my moments and my days, Let them flow in ceaseless praise, Let them flow in ceaseless praise.

Take my will and make it Thine, It shall be no longer mine; Thake my heart, it is Thine own, It shall be Thy royal throne, It shall be Thy royal throne.



FBC SPOTLIGHT

This month's Member Spotlight highlights a longtime, beloved member, Mrs. Frances Price.

Frances grew up on a farm in Western NC, was saved in 1943, worked her way through college in Berea, KY, and taught in high school near her hometown for two and half years. Convicted that she was not within God's will for her life, she prayed for forgiveness and guidance which led her to move to Whiteville in 1955 to work as a home economist. Soon after, she joined First Baptist and became active in the church. In 1956, at a Drama Organizational Meeting, she met Allen Price, a young widower. They married a year later in 1957. She then resigned her job to help rear her four year old stepson, Allen, who is now retired from an office management career. Allen and his wife Lucy live in Texas and have a daughter, Wendy, and two grandsons, Colton and Colby.

After five years and much prayer, God gave Allen and Frances a medical miracle—a son, Charles, who now supervises the Audio-Visual Department at Campbell University, while also attending classes as a part-time student at Campbell's Divinity School. He and Betty have a grown son and daughter, Joseph and Sarah.

In 2008, Frances lost her beloved husband, after a long nine year battle with cerebrovascular accidents (strokes).

The Price family was abundantly blessed with opportunities to serve Christ at First Baptist Church. Over the years they founded and led the Muppett Minstrels, which with capable assistance from other church members, performed locally and to different parts of the south. They enjoyed teaching Sunday School, singing in the choir, producing dramas, and leading Bible studies for new believers. For 25 years they recorded devotions which were broadcast locally before Sunday morning worship services.



For almost a year, Frances was our hospital's interim chaplain. After Allen's death, she served on the body of deacons. She currently chairs the e-mail prayer group and is a Hospice and RSVP volunteer. Her favorite scripture is Psalm 100. Her favorite hymn is "His Eye is on the Sparrow".

All activities, Frances humbly emphasizes, were done solely to bring honor and glory to the Christ Who never fails her through hard times and great times. She says: "I thank God for sending me to Whiteville. My Christian friends have loved, encouraged and blessed me over and over. I'm so grateful for a church that offers opportunities to learn and share the Good News here and abroad. My prayer is that every member will take seriously Christ's command to reach out to the many who don't know abundant life through Christ."



We are implementing a new section in the newsletter to discuss congregational life and to generate a greater awareness of why things are done the way they are.

Did you know that Rev. Clore usually follows the Revised Common Lectionary? What is the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL), you ask? The "Lectionary" provides Scripture readings from the Bible for worship services on Sundays in a three-year cycle. The pattern and collection of passages for each year typically follows the life cycle of Jesus' ministry. The lectionary provides a weekly Old Testament Reading, a Psalm, an Epistle, and a Gospel Reading. While our responsive readings for Sunday's worship usually come from the lectionary Psalm or Old Testament texts, Rev. Clore typically preaches sermons based on the weekly *Gospel* text.

Year 'A' follows a chronological order of selected passages in the Gospel of Matthew; Year 'B' follows a chronological order of selected passages in the Gospel of Mark; and Year 'C' follows a chronological order of selected passages in the Gospel of Luke. Readings from the Gospel of John can be found throughout years 'A', 'B', and 'C'. We are currently at the beginning of year 'A'. The beginning of the Advent season marked our new lectionary year.

Why follow the lectionary? Well, because we are Baptists, there is nothing that requires that we follow the RCL. But following the lectionary is a good way to ensure that your pastor is not continuing to choose his own favorite texts repeatedly. It also ensures that our congregation is getting a comprehensive understanding of the *entire* Gospel story. Those weeks when the pastor has a difficult time understanding how a particular passage may be speaking to him, are usually the times when God steps in and breathes life into the message in a way that the pastor never could have imagined.
